

City of Hudsonville 2022 Resident Survey July 12, 2022

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Introduction

In December 2021, the City of Hudsonville contracted with the Frost Center for Data and Research at Hope College to conduct a survey of its residents. The purpose of the survey was to determine residents' attitudes and behaviors related to the community of Hudsonville, including resources and services, priorities, living experience, community engagement, and information gathering/distribution. The survey also assessed residents' attitudes toward a proposed community center/library. The following report summarizes results from the survey.

Methodology


The Frost Center staff worked with the Hudsonville City Commission and City Manager to develop a questionnaire, which consisted of a total of 25 open- and closed-ended questions. In April, the City of Hudsonville alerted residents to the forthcoming survey with an announcement in its quarterly newsletter. In mid-May, each household (N=2,244) in the City of Hudsonville received a postcard inviting their participation in the survey. Residents could access the survey through a QR code or bit link, or could request a paper copy by calling the phone number provided on the postcard. The City of Hudsonville reminded residents to complete the survey through four e-blasts, all containing the survey link. The survey closed on Monday, June 13. The data were then downloaded, cleaned, and checked for consistency prior to analysis. Overall, 319 surveys were partially (n=21, average of 57.5% complete) or fully completed (n=298), but 3 respondents indicated that they did not currently live in the City of Hudsonville. As a result, the final sample consisted of 316 residents, yielding a response rate of 14.1%. In the final sample, 206 accessed the questionnaire through the QR code provided on the postcard or in the e-blast, 98 used the bit link provided on the postcard or in the e-blast, and 12 completed a paper copy. Given the sample size, the results can be interpreted using a +/-5% margin of error and a 95% confidence level.

Resident Survey Results

Demographics

Years Lived in the City of Hudsonville


When survey respondents indicated how long they have lived in the city of Hudsonville, responses ranged from one to 74 years, with a median of 15 years: half of respondents have lived in the city of Hudsonville for less than 15 years and about half have lived there for more than 15 years. Just over a third of residents (35.1%) have lived in the city of Hudsonville for 3 to 10 years.



How many years have you lived in the City of Hudsonville? (n=314)


Housing

Nearly all survey respondents (99.0%) reported that they own their housing. However, 24 respondents did not answer this question.




Age

Almost all respondents (94.9%) reported being between 25 and 74 years of age. Survey respondents (27.0%) most commonly selected the 35-44 years of age category.



Education

All survey respondents reported being high school graduates. More than half of respondents indicated that their highest level of schooling is a Bachelor's degree from a 4-year college (32.0%) or a Master's degree (18.9%).

Household Income

Survey respondents (54.4%) most commonly reported a total household income between \$50,000 and \$149,999. Nearly twenty percent of respondents, however, preferred not to answer the question.




Please specify your total household income bracket. Is it...

Main Findings

Impression of the City of Hudsonville


A clear majority of survey respondents (89.2%) rated living in the city of Hudsonville as either good or excellent.



Direction of the City of Hudsonville, the State of Michigan, and the USA

On average, survey respondents described the changes in the City of Hudsonville as going in the right direction, but indicated that the changes in the State of Michigan and the USA were headed in the wrong direction.



Resources and Services in the City of Hudsonville

On average, survey respondents rated all of the listed city resources and services above the scale midpoint of 3.00. Respondents rated the city parks, library, City of Hudsonville employees, and community events the highest, with each earning an average score above 4.00. Street maintenance was rated the lowest at 3.10.


On a scale of 1 to 5, with 1 meaning "very poor" and 5 meaning "very good," please specify the quality of the following resources or services in the City of Hudsonville.



Priorities for the City of Hudsonville

The average survey respondent believed that all options that were listed should be given relatively more priority, because each item received an average rating above the scale midpoint of 3.00. However, respondents gave highest priority to maintaining streets, followed by parks and playgrounds.



Experiences of Living in the City of Hudsonville


On average, survey respondents expressed positivity for all community experiences listed, because each item earned an average rating above the scale midpoint of 3.00. Of the items listed, survey respondents indicated that the city services, library, and parks contribute most to their living experience in the city of Hudsonville.



Community Engagement


In the last year, survey respondents were most likely to have engaged in the community by visiting downtown Hudsonville, visiting a city park, or voting in a local election. They were least likely to have attended a city commission or other city-related public meeting, contacted a city commissioner, or volunteered their time to an organization or activity in the city of Hudsonville.





When it comes to getting news about the City of Hudsonville, a majority of survey respondents (87.6%) reported that they rely on the City of Hudsonville quarterly newsletter. More than half of respondents (57.4%) make use of social media, and 41.9 percent depend on word of mouth. Fewer than 5 percent of survey respondents use any of the following information sources: city public access channel, city e-blasts, or city commission meetings. Only 3.2 percent of respondents mentioned a source of information not listed.

Of the following options, where do you typically get your information about the City of Hudsonville news and issues? (Select all that apply)




Other information sources listed by respondents included: "Chamber of Commerce emails," "City newsletter which often arrives after some of the events have already occurred," "coffee shops," "Commissioner," "planning commission," "talk to commissioners," "through my job working within the city," and "we occasionally will receive a mailer but it is rare."

Information Gathering and Distribution in the City of Hudsonville

Although 27.6 percent of survey respondents gave a neutral response by selecting the scale midpoint of 3, 62.7 percent agreed that the City of Hudsonville keeps residents informed about community issues and initiatives.




When it comes to the City of Hudsonville gathering feedback from residents on new policies or projects, the most common response from survey respondents was the neutral answer of 3, the scale midpoint. It was also common for respondents to respond just on either side of the midpoint, with 24 percent selecting a 4 (in the direction of strongly agree) and 18.4 percent choosing a 2 (in the direction of strongly disagree).

In regard to city taxes and fees, survey respondents most commonly indicated that they were just about right for the services received. However, 53.4 percent believed taxes and fees were somewhat too high or much too high. This number represents an increase from 2011 when 46% of respondents said that taxes were too high.




Proposed Community Center/Library

Nearly two-thirds of survey respondents (65%) indicated that they would support construction of a new Community Center/Library.


As you think about the potential construction of a new Community Center/Library building for the City of Hudsonville and the necessary funding to construct it, which of the following best describes your view? (n=297)

- I would not support the construction of a new Community Center/Library




At a new Community Center/Library, survey respondents indicated that it would be most important to include a senior center, youth center, community room, and gymnasium. With average ratings near or below the scale midpoint of 3.00, respondents thought it was least important to include a computer lab, study rooms/classrooms, multi-purpose performance space, indoor aquatic facility, or kitchen facility.

If a new Community Center/Library were constructed, which of the following amenities would you like to see included? Please rate each item on a scale of 1 to 5 with 1 meaning "not at all important to include" and 5 meaning "very important to include."



Although responses were spread across the five options, a majority of survey respondents (52.4%) indicated that they would "likely" or "definitely vote yes" for a millage increase in order to allow construction for a new Community Center/Library. However, 30.7 percent of respondents planned to vote no.



Additional comments or feedback on the idea of constructing a new Community Center/Library in the city: Respondents who answered this question (n=81) were much more likely to express the belief that a new Community Center/Library would simply duplicate services provided by schools, etc. They also were concerned about their tax bill increasing. However, some respondents used this open-ended question to express their enthusiasm. They believed that such a building would fill a need and strengthen the sense of community. Final Thoughts

What three things do you like most about living in the City of Hudsonville?




When responding to what they like most about living in Hudsonville, a variety of common themes emerged.

• **Characteristics of the community.** Respondents describe it as quiet, safe, and friendly. They like the small-town feel, but also describe it as a growing community. Respondents note the Christian and conservative values, availability of churches, and sense of pride in the community.

- **The city's location.** The city of Hudsonville is well-situated between other cities, such as Grand Rapids and Holland. Respondents value the ease of access to highways and Lake Michigan, as well as the number of restaurants and shopping options.
- Schools. Some respondents simply listed "schools" as something they liked about living in Hudsonville. Other respondents mentioned the school options, school system, or proximity to schools. Some used words such as "great," "excellent," or "phenomenal" to describe the schools.

Apart from the common themes listed above, respondents also mention other specific aspects of the city of Hudsonville. Respondents believe that it is easy to get around the city, especially because of its walkability, bike paths, and relatively low traffic. Respondents appreciate the parks and nature center, downtown, events (e.g., fair, Terra Square, Farmers Market), and quality of the library. Respondents note that Hudsonville is well-run, clean, and maintained well, and they spoke highly of the City of Hudsonville leadership.

All responses to this question can be found in Appendix I. The word cloud above was made from the responses to this question. Words in larger type in the word cloud appear more often in respondents' answers. The themes described above reflect the more common usage of these words.



What three things would you most like to change about the City of Hudsonville?

When responding to what they would like to change about the city of Hudsonville, several common themes emerged.

- **Downtown.** Respondents express a desire for a better and more developed/revitalized downtown. Some of these respondents mention the disjointed layout of downtown or issues with parking. Others believe that there needs to be something downtown to draw more people there, such as restaurants, a grocery store, or other events/venues. Fewer respondents call for less development or less prioritization of the downtown area.
- **Taxes.** Whereas some respondents simply list "taxes" as an area for change, other respondents specifically mention that the taxes are too high or call for lower taxes.
- Issues with roads and traffic. Some respondents simply comment on the roads or


heavy traffic without further explanation. However, other respondents provide more specific concerns. Of respondents who highlight specific issues related to roads and traffic, the most common concerns are for better maintenance of roads and with traffic on 32nd Avenue. Other specific concerns include too many semi-trucks, poor appearance alongside roads (e.g., power lines along Chicago Dr.), traffic light issues (e.g., light by Meijer, double traffic light at 32nd and Barry St.), not enough roads, and hazardous intersections (e.g., Chicago Dr./Van Buren St./32nd Ave. intersection). Some respondents provide ideas for improving traffic flow, such as adding lanes to busy streets, creating highway access at 48th Ave., and building a connecting street to get traffic off of 32nd Ave.

In addition to the common themes above, respondents also indicate other aspects of Hudsonville that they would like to change. Some respondents would like the City to continue to make it easier to move around Hudsonville. Respondents desire a continued focus on more bike paths and improved walkability. Respondents also indicate a need for safer options for crossing Chicago Drive.

Other respondents express concern about too much growth. Respondents articulating this concern do not want to lose the small-town feel that characterizes the city of Hudsonville. They desire for less development and a focus on more green space and farmland. Respondents also raise concerns about the number of apartment complexes, condominiums, and low-income housing developments. Also pertaining to housing, some respondents desire stricter enforcement of codes and ordinances.

A segment of respondents desires more diversity and inclusivity in the city of Hudsonville, as well as being more welcoming of outsiders (e.g., people not originally from Hudsonville). However, opinion is mixed. Whereas some respondents feel the residents of Hudsonville are too conservative, other respondents believe the thinking has become too progressive.

All responses to this question can be found in Appendix I. The word cloud above was made from the responses to this question. Words in larger type in the word cloud appear more often in respondents' answers. The themes described above reflect the more common usage of these words. What do you think are the three most important local issues the City of Hudsonville will face in the next 5 years?



When reflecting on issues that the City of Hudsonville will face in the next 5 years, some common themes appeared.

- **Traffic.** With the growth of Hudsonville, respondents express concern about increases in traffic volume. Respondents mention specific roads such as 32nd Ave. and Chicago Dr., as well as only one access point to I-196.
- **Population growth and its consequences.** As the city continues to grow, respondents communicate concerns about increases in crime, roads in disrepair, overcrowded schools, loss of community spirit, and housing affordability.

• **Downtown development.** When mentioning the issue of downtown, some respondents simply listed general words or phrases such as "downtown," "downtown development," or "downtown improvement." However, other respondents provided more specific issues related to downtown that the City of Hudsonville will face. Residents cite issues with congestion and lack of parking downtown, as well as a desire for better shopping and restaurants downtown.

Adding to the common themes above, respondents also believe Hudsonville will face issues with too much spending and high (property) taxes. Some respondents wonder how a recession would impact the city of Hudsonville. Furthermore, the city of Hudsonville has an aging population and is experiencing a change in culture because of increased diversity. A segment of respondents believes it is important to be more welcoming to diverse groups of people.

It would also be nice to have a bike path there because it would be a beautiful place to walk with a stroller.

- Community center yes. Library- no, they are a thing of the past. Keep current one but don't build new.
- Community center should have rooms available for use by the community and a rental should be charged unless it is a city sponsored activity. I'm not sure if Hudsonville has a rec department, but sports activities, aquatics, etc. should be funded by a rec department in a separate facility with a charge for these activities. The entire community should not have to pay for this if they are not using it.
- Community Centers have proven to help small towns become healthy social environments where people of all ages can feel they not only belong but feel they have a voice.
- Does the community center need the library too? Can we just do community center and not a library? New library is a terrible idea I would never support. New community center I could get on board with.
- Don't replicate something that is already provided at the school or by local business. Tax payer dollars already support an aquatic center, large gymnasium, etc. There are small businesses that provide fitness opportunities. I think the new library is the thing to invest in and offering some performance spaces would enhance an evening out in downtown Hudsonville. Also, computer access is very prevalent. Anything more than what a library typically provides would be excessive.


